CHAPTER I

The writer has been really inspired by the work done by Yanti in 2013, who studied Emotion, Especially Anger Emotion *entitled The Manifestation of Anger Emotions: A Case Study of Obama - McCain Presidential Debates*, analyzed how words are employed to express the emotion of Anger by Obama and McCain.

Goleman (1997:411) explained that Emotional Expression or emotion refers to feelings and special thoughts, some of the biological conditions and psychological conditions, and also the motivation to act. He further classifies several emotional Emotions in human beings and their mutation, variation, and nuance.

Talking about emotion, the writer usually can find a lot of kinds of emotions such as sadness, Anger, happiness, and other kinds of emotions. Even without knowing, we can find those things in our daily activities, in comics, or in a novel. These are the things that inspired me to take emotion as the theme to analyze in my research. I have read a few literary works that talk about emotion. A lot of literature talks about Anger Emotion, to be specific, and those literary works really inspired me to analyze the emotion of Anger. In this research, the writers chose the *movie 13 Reasons Why* as the object to be analyzed. This intricate and heart-wrenching tale is told through Clay and Hannah's dual narratives.

1.1 Limitation of the Research

There are numbers of aspects that the writer can analyze in this movie entitled 13 Reasons Why, but the writer limited his research only to discuss the pragmatics field. The writer limits his research to the emotion of Anger from this movie. The writer focused on analyzing verbal communication of Anger context in this research. The writer chose to analyze the Emotion of Anger in the movie "13 Reasons Why" in the form of verbal (Words).
